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REPORT ON MEMBER STATE REPLIES TO THE QUESTIONNAIRE ON INTEGRATED POLICE UNITS, FORMED POLICE UNITS, NATIONAL AND MULTINATIONAL POLICE EXPERT TEAMS AND OTHER CIVILIAN "NICHE" CAPABILITIES

I. SUMMARY

This report takes stock of the situation regarding niche capabilities in 2013-2014, based on information supplied by 17 Member States. It offers a snapshot, not an inventory, and is limited in scope to civilian CSDP. In presenting the main points from 17 questionnaires, the report identifies the greatest potential in expert teams (heading C, below) and other niche capabilities (heading D). The report does not identify widespread activity relating to IPUs (heading A) and FPUs (heading B) beyond that already recognised in the framework of the European Gendarmerie Force (EGF).

II. CONTEXT OF THIS REPORT

The initiative to gather information on niche capabilities should be seen in the context of the Council conclusions of 23 July 2012, in which the Council renewed "its commitment to support sustainable civilian capability development by the Member States, to address capability gaps and ensure that in the future also the required capabilities will be available". It is a constant challenge for civilian CSDP to ensure that capability shortfalls are identified in a timely manner and addressed appropriately. Previous examples of such shortfalls include finding the specialised police profiles required for EULEX Kosovo and recruiting sufficient numbers of French speaking personnel or qualified experts in the rule of law. More specialised niche capabilities such as expertise in aviation security have also recently been in demand.

In the context of the above Council conclusions, the PSC adopted the multi-annual Civilian Capability Development Plan (CCDP) (doc 12110/12) as "the lasting framework for CSDP civilian capability development". The CCDP foresees the establishment of an inventory:

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"An updated inventory of potentially available experts and niche capabilities in Member States should enhance our insight into the real capabilities the Union can currently field and help us direct further action to improve these capabilities where needed. Indeed, maximizing the existing resources is an important objective for the EU."

In parallel with adoption of the CCDP, the PSC also agreed on Action Lines to guide civilian capability development under CSDP (doc 12111/12). This document gives further details about the intention behind the questionnaire:

"To establish an inventory of Member States' police elements **not included in the EGF** Catalogue (emphasis added), the EEAS will issue a dedicated questionnaire. This questionnaire will invite Member States to indicate the areas where they are developing highly qualified national expert teams with specific capabilities, in accordance with existing guidelines and concepts for police rapid deployment, to be used to compose Specialised Elements within a CSDP mission, or other so-called "niche" capabilities of other dedicated civilian personnel that may be used for crisis management."

It should be underlined that work on "niche capabilities" is linked with wider ongoing efforts in civilian CSDP capability development, giving an overview of capabilities existing throughout the Member States of the EU. It also helps in the identification of shortfalls, rational use of scarce resources and improving civil-military synergies. This is in line with the wish of the European Council to improve the generation of civilian capabilities and fully implement the CCDP, including by developing a List of Generic civilian CSDP tasks and finalising the Goalkeeper project.

On 17 September 2013, the EEAS therefore circulated a questionnaire on 'Integrated Police Units, Formed Police Units, national and multinational police expert teams and other civilian "niche" capabilities' (9973/3/13). Member States were invited to reply by the end of 2013. 17 finally did so: CZ, EE, EL, ES, FI, FR, HU, IE, IT, LT, LV, NL, PL, PT, RO, SE and UK.

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III. FINDINGS

Existence of police forces compliant with the IPU (Integrated Police Unit) concept

As recalled in the questionnaire, the characteristics of an IPU were defined in the 'Concept for rapid deployment of police elements in an EU-led substitution mission' (doc. 8508/2/05). The main elements are:

- A structured and existing unit, with its own chain of command, possessing common TTP's (technical tactical procedures), training and availability of logistics;
- (b) Robust, rapidly deployable, flexible and interoperable;
- (c) Suitable for deployment in unstable situations;
- (d) May be placed temporarily under the responsibility of a military authority entrusted with the protection of the population;
- (e) Capable of self-protection in performing standard police operations;
- Able to perform a large spectrum of police functions. (f)

A.1 Does your Country have Police Units that can be put under (temporary) military command, and/or Teams that can be deployed as part of an IPU in line with 8508/2/05 and that have not been included in the EGF catalogue of capabilities but could, in principle, be put at the disposal of the EU under CSDP?

It is taken that the seven Member States which contribute to the EGF (ES, FR, LT, NL, PL, PT and RO) have police forces that could fit with the IPU concept. Broadly speaking, however, the units concerned are already included in the EGF catalogue of capabilities. In order to avoid confusion and double-counting, those capabilities listed in the EGF catalogue have not been considered here.

Beyond EGF contributors, only HU indicates that some of its Police Units "can be put under military command without any difficulties" and "can be deployed as part of an international rapid deployment element".

By contrast, eight Member States (CZ, EE, EL, FI, IE, LV, SE and UK) confirm directly that the IPU concept is not applicable to them. It may be supposed that the remaining 13 Member States which did not reply explicitly would also not embrace the IPU concept, meaning that IPUs are not used in the planning of a clear majority of Member States.

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A.2 The IPU Concept provides for a "battalion-size" IPU type A structure. Is this notion still of relevance?

If a battalion is taken to mean a force of 300-1200, this scale of deployment is judged prohibitive, even by EGF contributors, though some express openness to deployment of company size IPUs.

Formed Police Units (FPUs). В.

The characteristics of an FPU, as defined in doc. 8508/2/05, are essentially:

- A police unit with common TTPs, training and availability of operational equipment and (a) weapons, which can be constituted by integrating several smaller sized units, from one or more Member States:
- Rapidly deployable, flexible and interoperable; (b)
- Not necessarily pre-existing, but formed for deployment to a specific theatre outside the EU; (c)
- (d) Not normally deployed to unstable situations, though this may be done with appropriate selfprotection capability;
- (e) Cannot be placed under military command;
- (f) Performs executive police tasks as mentioned in the "substitution mission" scenario.

B.1Indicate the number of Police Units deployable as FPUs.

Replies under this heading are presented in table B (in annex).

The following main observations may be made:

The capabilities listed in the table are from ES, IT, PL and RO. Some capabilities are from the police services, not from the gendarmerie.

HU indicated that it was in the process of setting up an FPU. This would be formed of 18 police officers, who could be deployed within 30 days for a maximum of 12 months. Any decision on possible deployment is to be taken case-by-case, based on political and financial considerations.

EEAS 01803/14 MK/sbt CZ also indicated that it has a team of 10 policemen within its contribution of police experts to EULEX Kosovo, which participate in the SPU (Special Police Unit), including as its Deputy Head.

It is understood that those Member States contributing to EGF have units that could potentially be deployed as formed police units (FPUs). Since these would already be included in the EGF catalogue of capabilities, however, they have not been considered here.

As under section A, eight Member States (CZ, EE, EL, FI, IE, LV, SE and UK) inform that they do not maintain FPUs which could be deployed beyond their borders.

Further work on FPU capabilities should take account of UN standards and should be compatible with UN FPU concepts¹. This objective is already clearly set out in the plan of Plan of Action to enhance EU CSDP support to UN peacekeeping (doc. 11216/12, Action F 3).

B.2 Provide lessons identified with the deployment of Police Units as FPUs in international crisis management conducted by the EU or UN.

HU highlighted its experience with EUFOR Althea:

Details on past deployment:

A platoon size unit was deployed as part of the EUFOR Althea operation between 01 Aug 2005 and 31. Dec 2007. This unit conducted general patrolling, CRC (crowd and riot control) activity, arrest of war criminals, close protection activity, setting up and operating check points.

Experiences with interoperability with other elements of the mission concerned:

Cooperation and coordination with other nations' units and with the local law enforcement forces were excellent.

Experiences with training provided at national and/or international level:

The pre-deployment course before the mission was effective and useful according to the members of the unit. Several joint trainings were held on the ground in cooperation with other units which increased the interoperability. They also provided trainings for the local forces and other international military units on policing.

RO highlighted its experience with UNMIK and EULEX:

Under UNMIK mandate: to help ensure conditions for a peaceful and normal life for all inhabitants of Kosovo and advance regional stability in the western Balkans: the Mission's mandate included:

- demilitarizing armed groups;
- providing security for return of the displaced and refugees;
- monitoring border;
- facilitating the political process;
- building government capacity

Under EULEX mandate: to assist and support the authorities with the rule of law, namely the judiciary, police and customs services, patrolling public surveillance

- public order
- civil disorder
- riot and crowd control
- escorts
- VIP escorts
- close protection (fixed and mobile)

National and multinational police expert teams

According to the Concept for rapid deployment of police elements in an EU-led substitution mission (doc. 8508/2/05), a National Expert Team is:

- A group of police officers pre-established within a Member State; (a)
- (b) Trained and equipped to undertake a specific specialised task or set of tasks;
- Deployable for international crisis management. (c)

C.1 Indicate the quantity and characteristics of National Police Expert Teams that Member States have developed, or are developing.

Replies from member states under this heading are presented in table C.1 (in annex).

EEAS 01803/14 MK/sbt The following main observations may be made.

10 Member States indicate that they have National Police Expert Teams (NPETs) or individuals available (EL, ES, FR, HU, IT, LT, NL, PL, PT and UK).

These NPETs cover a wide range of expert areas:

- Anti-corruption (UK);
- Aviation patrolling / security (HU, IT);
- Border management / policing (EL, ES, FI, HU, IT, NL);
- Canine units (HU, PT, RO);
- Close protection (EE, HU, NL, RO);
- Coast-guard (ES, HU);
- Community police (ES, PL, UK);
- Counter-narcotics (FR);
- Counter-terrorism (EL, ES, FR, HU, PT, RO);
- CRC (crowd and riot control) public order (EE, HU, LT, PL, PT);
- Criminal investigation (ES, LT, PL, UK);
- Environmental police (ES, PT);
- Forensics, victim identification (EE, ES, FI, FR, HU, IT, LT, LV, NL, UK);
- Juvenile crime (FR, PL).
- Mountain and rescue support (FI, IT, RO);
- Negotiation experts (ES, NL, PT);
- Organised crime (EL, FI, HU);
- Prison security (FI, IT);
- SWAT (EE, FR, LT, NL, PT, RO);
- Traffic police (EE, HU, IT, PT);
- Training (HU, LT, UK);
- War crimes investigation (FI, HU).

Many Member States work with rosters of deployable experts; though they may not be able to deploy big teams, they may consider deploying a small number of experts in a given field. Most national teams can be deployed in English speaking missions. A considerable number of these

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C.2 Indicate the quantity and characteristics of multinational teams in specific areas of policing deployable under CSDP that Member States coordinate or participate in.

The replies from IT and ES under this heading are presented in table C.2 (in annex).

D. Other civilian "niche" capabilities

Other "niche" capabilities are national or multinational teams deployable to international crisis management missions that consist of *non-police* civilian personnel trained and equipped to undertake a specific specialised task or set of tasks (e.g. advisory teams).

Indicate the quantity and characteristics of "niche" capabilities that have been developed nationally.

Replies under this heading are presented in table D.1 (in annex).

The following main observations may be made.

10 Member States (EE, EL, FI, FR, HU, IE, NL, SE and UK) indicate that they have "niche" capabilities available.

Some of the capabilities listed cover areas of recognised shortfalls:

- Mission support (FR, HU, RO, SE);
- ICT (Information and Communications Technology) (EE, IE).

Other capabilities cover areas of concern, with substantial numbers potentially available:

- Customs and smuggling (CZ, EL);
- Gender (IE, NL);
- Healthcare (EE);
- Human rights (NL);

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- Rule of Law (CZ, EE, EL, HU);
- Sexually based violence (UK);
- SSR (security sector reform) (FI, SE).

Some capabilities go beyond the CSDP policy area:

- Election management (EE);
- Environment and public health (FR, IE);
- Conflict prevention (HU);
- Cyber security (EE, FI).

Others are not covered by civilian CSDP mandates.

Mine clearance (EE, IE).

Member States (EE, EL, FR, HU, IE, NL) lean towards operating rosters or pools of individuals with different types of specialist expertise, though some can also raise teams (FI, SE, UK).

Indicate the quantity and characteristics of multinational teams in specific civilian areas, deployable also under CSDP, which they coordinate or participate in. Please include teams operating under bilateral arrangements or in the external dimension of internal security.

Replies under this heading are presented in table D.2 (in annex).

It is worth mentioning that the set-up of national or multinational teams, if requested, is welcomed by a number of Member States which can send individual experts.

IV. CONCLUSIONS

The replies to the questionnaire provide a useful, if incomplete, snapshot of the situation across the EU in 2013-2014. The information gathered does not constitute an inventory. The replies received reflect different levels of detail, and contributions have to a different extent been collated from different ministerial sources. The issues encountered in compiling this report and its annexes highlight the difficulties in the way of achieving an accurate, comprehensive inventory.

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Nonetheless, a mapping of civilian capabilities, even partial, creates a sense of the possible range of civilian capabilities. The present work will feed into ongoing efforts on civilian capability development, such as the establishment of a list of civilian CSDP tasks, which is in progress and to be finalised by the end of 2014. Once ready it will indicate what generic tasks could be covered by civilian CSDP. This would help us to link demand and supply, better anticipate gaps, explore synergies, and envisage what future capabilities could be required.

The aim of identifying civilian capabilities is not to establish rosters, but to make best use of Member States' strengths and interests in building specific capabilities, and to ensure the best possible coordination of scarce civilian resources. The replies collected here show that there is scope for further development of expert teams and niche capabilities.

The use of IPUs and FPUs is not as widespread as was foreseen when the respective concepts were drafted in 2002-2006. Instead, the trend has moved in the direction of deploying individuals rather than units or teams. Currently, it is mainly those Member States contributing to EGF that are likely to deploy IPUs and FPUs. The EGF catalogue of capabilities therefore provides a useful reference available to all Member States. Cooperation between the EU and EGF, being pursued on its own track, represents a useful resource.

If the need for deployment of bigger teams should arise, this should be considered within the context of ongoing work on rapid and efficient deployment under civilian CSDP.

Given that a number of Member States are developing capabilities in related areas, there is some potential to explore the notion of "functional teams" for the purposes of CSDP. There is certainly scope to explore the development of synergies between Member States. Some areas may be identified where there would be scope for the exchange of best practice:

- where international agreed norms and standards exists (e.g. forensics);
- where shared tactics/techniques are widely accepted (e.g. canine units).

This would make it easier to put together teams ad hoc from different nationalities.

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As regards the deployment of small numbers of individuals, the experience gained in the use of "visiting experts" to reinforce missions should be taken into account. Gaps identified in this and other contexts should be highlighted, and attempts should be made to remediate possible shortfalls.

V. NEXT STEPS

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Preparations for the forthcoming sixth edition of the high-level seminar – on "Facilitating the deployment of civilian personnel for CSDP" – due to be held in Brussels on 10 October 2014, also cover issues raised in this report.
