

Legal background & objectives

- ✓ Fundamental rights monitoring = core fundamental rights protection tool → preventative; enhances the protection of victims; supports domestic investigations; improves transparency and accountability
- ✓ When monitoring, attention should be paid to all fundamental rights (FR) guaranteed under the EU Charter
- ✓ FRA updated its <u>2022 guidance</u>, following Art. 10 & recitals of the **Screening Reg**. and consulting various stakeholders





Elements for an independent national monitoring mechanism

Guidance covers **nine key aspects** (building blocks):

- 1. Independence and operational autonomy
- 2. Thematic coverage
- 3. Powers of the monitoring mechanism
- 4. Facilitating investigations
- 5. Staffing and expertise
- 6. Resources and funding
- 7. Reporting, transparency and accountability
- 8. Synergies with existing monitoring mechanisms
- 9. Cooperation with other authorities and actors



1. Independence and operational autonomy

Guaranteed in law

Ombuds institutions/NHRIs to be prioritised

Free of any institutional affiliation with the responsible authorities

Transparent recruitment of the staff of national monitoring mechanism

Operational autonomy & authority to take action on its own initiative

Periodically evaluated



2. Thematic coverage

Screening process & asylum border procedure

MSs may extend it to border management & return border procedure

Monitoring the actual implementation of FR safeguards



3. Powers of the monitoring mechanism



Conduct periodic, random, and unannounced visits



Unimpeded access to all activities during screening [and asylum border procedure]



Access documents, registers and records etc.



Right to speak to all organisations and people



Right to record its activities



Appropriate security clearance



4. Facilitating investigations

System to be in place to record all allegations of FR violations

Right to receive complaints

Direct communication with investigative authorities

Monitor and report on the progress of the investigations

In case of having own investigative powers, activate that internally



5. Staffing and expertise



Appropriately staffed & with relevant knowledge & experience



Multidisciplinary approach



Regular on-the-job training for the staff



To pool knowledge, close cooperation with other human rights monitoring mechanisms, NGOs, academia, experts in FR



6. Resources and funding

Appropriate financial means & sufficient for its tasks

Compliance with principle of independence

Access EU funds for its activities



7. Reporting, transparency and accountability





8. Synergies with existing monitoring mechanisms

Coherence and complementarity & information sharing

Take into account information from third parties

Cooperation with national, regional & international bodies in charge of protection of FR (NHRIs and Ombuds institutions)

Build on existing monitoring mandates

Communicate findings to Sch-Eval, FX vulnerability assessments, EUAA monitoring mechanism, and national monitoring committees for EU funds

W/O prejudice to and support activities of Frontex FRM and EUAA monitoring mechansim



9. Cooperation with other authorities and actors



Duty to cooperate through regular exchange of information and respecting the mechanism's mandate



National legislation stipulating such a duty
