## Migration and forced displacement

Migration, mobility and forced displacement are priorities of the EU. Addressing the risks and vulnerabilities underpinning irregular migration and forced displacement while harnessing the benefits of regular migration is critical to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and to ensure that no one is left behind.

The 7<sup>th</sup> target of the 10<sup>th</sup> Sustainable Development Goal (SDG10) prescribes "to facilitate orderly, safe, regular and responsible migration and mobility of people, including through the implementation of planned and well-managed migration policies". In this context, well-managed migration can contribute to make progress towards development and to reduce inequalities.

At the EU level, the [European Consensus on Development \(2017\)](#) mirrors the UN 2030 Agenda. It acknowledges both the challenges of migration and the opportunities it brings for inclusive growth and sustainable development when well-managed. It considers that poverty, conflict, fragility and forced displacement are deeply interlinked and must be addressed in a coherent and comprehensive way, also as part of the humanitarian-development-peace nexus.

At the same time, the EU Pact on Migration and Asylum (2020) foresees a comprehensive and balanced engagement with partner countries, with focus on key countries of origin, transit and destination, and a specific approach aimed at establishing tailor-made, mutually beneficial partnerships.

## Context

At the end of 2022, conflict, violence, and crises displaced 43.3 million children, the highest number since the Second World War. This includes:

- 17.5 million refugee and asylum-seeking children
- 25.8 million internally displaced children

Millions of children are left behind when their parents migrate, yet reliable, age- and gender-specific data on their situations remain scarce. Many countries lack disaggregated data on migrant and refugee populations, leaving critical knowledge gaps in understanding the risks, challenges, and vulnerabilities these children face.
